The Conclusion March 15, 2026

Summary

In this sermon, Kyle shares how Habakkuk 3 demonstrates how to have unwavering faith during difficult and uncertain times. After questioning God about injustice and struggling to understand God's plan, Habakkuk ends his book with a prayer of worship that models three responses: remember, respond and request. He remembers how God has been faithful throughout history, which leads him to respond with trust and joy even though he knows hardship is coming. Instead of asking God for a specific outcome, Habakkuk simply asks for the strength to trust God, declaring that the Sovereign Lord is his strength. The message reminds us that when life feels chaotic and God's promises seem distant, we can remember His past faithfulness, trust His Word and ask Him to help us stand firm in faith no matter what happens.

Lord, I have heard of your fame;

I stand in awe of your deeds, Lord.
