Don't Be a Fool April 19, 2026

Summary

In today's sermon, Pastor Jon Odom continues our series *Solomon Gets a Smartphone*. In a world full of information—and misinformation—it can be hard to know what is true. Proverbs 13:20 teaches that we become wise by walking closely with wise people, not by relying on our own opinions or what we see online. While technology can be helpful, it can also shape our thinking in unhealthy ways if we are not careful. God's Word is our ultimate standard for truth, and Jesus is the perfect example of what truth looks like. We grow in wisdom not just by hearing truth, but by seeing it lived out in the lives of others. That's why relationships with mature, godly people and involvement in a church community are essential. If we want to live wisely, we must intentionally surround ourselves with people who know and follow Jesus.
