AI and the End May 3, 2026

Summary

This sermon teaches that while artificial intelligence is a powerful and useful tool, it does not change what it fundamentally means to be human: We are created by God to have purpose (vocation), to live within limits, to be deeply relational and to seek true wisdom from Him. AI can assist with knowledge and productivity, but it cannot replace our need for meaningful work, authentic relationships or God-given moral discernment. Nor can it offer ultimate hope or eternal life—those are found only in Jesus. Therefore, as we engage with AI and advancing technology, we are called to do so with wisdom and by honoring God, respecting our limits and remembering that true knowledge begins with a right relationship with Him.
