Revelation & Rebellion July 5, 2026

Summary

Psalm 19 reminds us that God reveals Himself in two powerful ways: through His creation and through His Word. The heavens silently proclaim God's glory, power and creativity, leaving all people without excuse for recognizing that there is a Creator. Yet while creation points us to God, only His Word clearly reveals His will and exposes the sin that keeps us from living as He intended. Like the sun brings light, warmth, and life, God's Word refreshes our souls, gives us wisdom, brings us joy and guides us away from destructive paths. As we spend intentional time noticing God's creation and reflecting on Scripture, the Holy Spirit reshapes us into the image of Christ so that we participate in God's work of restoring His world rather than contributing to its brokenness.

Scripture

The heavens declare the glory of God;
the skies proclaim the work of his hands.
Day after day they pour forth speech;
night after night they reveal knowledge.
They have no speech, they use no words;
no sound is heard from them.
Yet their voice goes out into all the earth,
their words to the ends of the world.
In the heavens God has pitched a tent for the sun.
It is like a bridegroom coming out of his chamber,
like a champion rejoicing to run his course.
It rises at one end of the heavens
and makes its circuit to the other;
nothing is deprived of its warmth.
The law of the Lord is perfect,
refreshing the soul.
The statutes of the Lord are trustworthy,
making wise the simple.
The precepts of the Lord are right,
giving joy to the heart.
The commands of the Lord are radiant,
giving light to the eyes.
The fear of the Lord is pure,
enduring forever.
The decrees of the Lord are firm,
and all of them are righteous.

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They are more precious than gold,
than much pure gold;
they are sweeter than honey,
than honey from the honeycomb.
By them your servant is warned;
in keeping them there is great reward.
But who can discern their own errors?
Forgive my hidden faults.
Keep your servant also from willful sins;
may they not rule over me.
Then I will be blameless,
innocent of great transgression.
May these words of my mouth and this meditation of my heart
be pleasing in your sight,

1. What is something in creation that recently caused you to stop and marvel at God? What did it reveal to you about His character?

3. Kyle described sin as "unmaking" God's good creation. Where do you see that happening in our world, in relationships or even in your own life?
4. Verse 14 asks that both our words and our thoughts be pleasing to God. Why do you think David includes both our speech and our hearts?
5. In the sermon, Kyle encouraged spending intentional time in both God's Word and God's world. Which of those comes more naturally to you, and which would you like to grow in?
6. What is one area of your life where God may be inviting you to bring restoration instead of contributing to brokenness this week?
